In our geography topic this block, we will be learning all about trade and resources!


Throughout this topic, we will discover how the natural materials around us are used, where they come from and how they are transformed into the products we use every day. We will look at the journey these products take, from their origins to our homes, and how trade connects different parts of the world, including the important link between the UK and the USA. During this topic, we will also delve into the history of trade, understanding how global trade has evolved, and consider its impact on communities and the environment. Alongside this, we will discuss concepts like fair trade and

globalisation to help develop an understanding of the importance of ethical and sustainable practices in our interconnected world.



Book recommendation

Aya is eleven years old and has just arrived in Britain with her mum and baby brother, seeking asylum from war in Syria. When Aya stumbles across a local ballet class, the formidable dance teacher spots her



exceptional talent and believes that Aya has the potential to earn a prestigious ballet scholarship.

But at the same time, Aya and her family must fight to be allowed to remain in the country, to make a home for themselves and to find Aya's father – separated from the rest of the family during the journey from Syria.

With beautiful, captivating writing, wonderfully authentic ballet detail, and an important message championing the rights of refugees, this is classic storytelling – filled with warmth, hope and humanity.

<u>Homework</u>

<u>English</u>

In English this block, we will be reading the powerful novel, Street Child by Berlie Doherty. Set in Victorian England, the story follows Jim Jarvis, a young boy facing the harsh realities of poverty and life in a workhouse.

To begin the block, we will step into Jim's shoes by writing a diary entry from his perspective, capturing the struggles and emotions of living in poverty. We will then use creative writing skills to craft a fictional biography for one of the book's characters, bringing their backstory to life. Finally, we will conclude our unit developing persuasive writing techniques by taking on Jim's voice to write a formal letter to the workhouse authorities, pleading for improved conditions.

This unit will give children the opportunity to explore rich themes of empathy, resilience, and social justice while developing their descriptive, narrative, and persuasive writing skills. We look forward to seeing the thoughtful and imaginative responses this important story inspires!



<u>Maths</u>

In our maths lessons this term, we will be continuing to practise written methods of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. This will include: working with numbers with up to two decimal places, learning how to interpret a remainder as a decimal and fraction and using the order of operations to solve problems. Following this, we will be practising mental calculations and developing our ability to reason from known facts.

We will also begin our fractions unit this half term! We will recap equivalent fractions before learning how to simplify fractions, convert between improper and mixed number fractions and compare and order fractions with different numerators



and denominators.

We will also continue with our big push on timestables, as these form an important basis for many areas of the maths curriculum. Please encourage your child to access TT Rock Stars as often as possible to support them with this.

Partnership Books

This term we will be continuing with our reading reward system which was launched earlier this year. Each class will become

'Reading Rocketeers' aiming to get to 'space' (200 reads) by the end of the academic year. Children are encouraged to read at home every day and to make a note in their partnership book every time they read outside of school. After every 20 reads, they

will get one step closer to space and will be rewarded with a token which they can 'spend' on prizes and, of course, books! I will be checking every **Thursday**.
